❖ Chapter 3:

- How does the creature describe his earliest memories?
- Does this in any way modify your reactions to him?

❖ Chapter 4:

- Think about the different ways in which the monster's education is advanced in this chapter:

- by his observation of the de Lacey family;
- by contemplating his reflection.
- How is the fable about the ass and the lapdog relevant to the creature's situation?

❖ Chapter 5:

The monster acquires a lot more knowledge about human life in the chapter. As a result, what conclusions does he reach about his own situation?
